

2014 Report to the Community

### From the President:

It is hard to believe that six years have passed since many of us sat down for the first time as a member of Wellwood's Board. We were all younger then – and some of us were greener than others.

Wellwood was ahead of its time in valuing the voice of young adults at the Board table. Several of us started on this Board when we were just in our 20s. The torch has now been passed to Sadisha Galappatti, a third-year McMaster student who began volunteering with us when he was just 16. This experience has been a large part of our personal growth. The camaraderie, collaboration, mentorship, fellowship and connections that have been forged at the table in Wellwood's gathering room have been inspiring.

The spark was ignited for me when I started on the Board of Directors in 2008. The AGM that year was held at our community site, which was then still a construction zone of unfinished space, with the proceedings illuminated by temporary worklights attached to extension cords and hung on nails. An incredible sense of "unlimited possibility" hung in the air around us back then (along with all that sawdust) which has culminated in what Wellwood has become today.

The Board came together at a retreat last October to develop what is emerging as our new strategic vision for Wellwood, and this represents a positive shift to move to other priorities and directions, now that the goals for the space have been realized. There are challenges ahead, no doubt, not the least of which will be fiscal. I have every confidence that these shall be met head on by the incoming Board.

Among the highlights of my own Presidency: Our quick capital campaign for the hospital site (a welcome relief knowing the community site campaign had been such a long haul); the opportunity to host the grand opening of the hospital site and honour our founders; and, most recently, the presentation to Wellwood of the City's first organizational Diversity Champion award.



This Board knew that, to be a truly inclusive organization, intention is not enough. We recognized it takes tools, language, extensive consultation, identification of potential barriers, training, partnerships, investment of human and financial resources....all of which has led to a more richly diverse gathering of voice and experiences here. Inclusivity is woven into the very fabric of who we are and what we do. This Board – every one of us – should be fiercely proud of this award and all that is represents.


# Let's face it. Running a charity is a challenge!
